History of New London United Methodist Church

The first settlement at New London was made in 1824 by Ambrose Jones who came from New London, Connecticut. It was from this place that New London derived its name. He built the first frame dwelling where the hotel now stands.

In 1835 the Methodist Church society held their service in the two school houses. One school house was on the North side of the Erie Canal and the other on the South side. The Rev. David Stone preached in the North side school house and the Rev. John Brown held his service in the South side school house. The exact date of the Methodist Church organization is unknown but presumed to be 1847.

In 1843 the society purchased the church building that was known as the Priest Brainard Church which stood near the highway leading from Blackman's Corners to Verona and moved it to New London. This was the first church building and was later used by George Wright as a store house.

In 1863 the school on the North side of the Erie Canal and the school on the South side consolidated and a Union Free School was built on the old site, where the brick school stood.

The present church building was purchased from the second Lutheran church society of Churchville and moved in 1888 to the present location. The bell in this church originally was in a church in Boonville that burned and was purchased from E.M. Kent, a junk dealer, in 1888.

New London Methodist Church celebrated its 100th birthday in 1947. In February of 1927 Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McCormick Sr. purchased the parsonage as a home. Our church hall was dedicated when Rev. Robert Holmes was the pastor here and Rev. Howard Holmes was District Superintendent.
